

INTERVIEWING IN MUSIC CAREERS

Music interviews are often performance-based, collaborative, and highly competitive. Employers are evaluating:

- ✓ your musicianship and technical ability
- ✓ your professionalism
- ✓ your preparation and discipline
- ✓ your collaboration skills
- ✓ your adaptability and reliability
- ✓ your communication style
- ✓ your ability to receive feedback and direction
- ✓ how you contribute to ensembles / productions

In many music environments, employers are asking: “Would this person be prepared, collaborative, and dependable in rehearsals and performances?”

PREPARING FOR THE INTERVIEW

Research the Organization

Strong preparation demonstrates professionalism and genuine interest. Before the interview, understand:

- ✓ the organization’s mission and artistic style
- ✓ recent performances or projects
- ✓ ensemble culture and expectations
- ✓ directors, conductors, or faculty
- ✓ the role and responsibilities

PREPARING YOUR MATERIALS

Make sure materials are organized, professional, current, and tailored to the opportunity. Depending on the role, employers may ask for:

- ✓ performance resumes or CVs
- ✓ recordings or audition videos
- ✓ repertoire lists
- ✓ teaching philosophy statements
- ✓ portfolios or websites
- ✓ composition or arranging samples

AUDITIONS & PERFORMANCE INTERVIEWS

Some music interviews may include:

- ✓ live auditions
- ✓ sight-reading
- ✓ teaching demonstrations
- ✓ ensemble rehearsals
- ✓ interviews with faculty or directors
- ✓ portfolio or repertoire discussions

Before the Audition or Interview

- ✓ Review audition requirements carefully
- ✓ Prepare and organize materials in advance
- ✓ Arrive early and warmed up
- ✓ Dress appropriately for the setting
- ✓ Practice introducing yourself confidently

TALKING ABOUT YOUR WORK

Be prepared to discuss:

- ✓ your musical background
- ✓ rehearsal and performance experiences
- ✓ collaboration and ensemble work
- ✓ teaching or leadership experiences
- ✓ creative or technical decisions
- ✓ challenges you faced
- ✓ lessons learned from performances

Avoid focusing only on talent or performance outcomes. Instead, explain your preparation process, your role within ensembles, how you collaborate, and how you continue improving as a musician.

COMMON MUSIC INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

General Questions

- Tell me about yourself.
- Why are you interested in this position?
- Why do you want to work with our organization?
- What interests you most about music?
- What types of musical experiences excite you most?

Performance & Preparation Questions

- Describe your practice process.
- How do you prepare for performances or auditions?
- Describe a performance you are proud of.
- How do you handle performance pressure?
- Tell me about a challenging musical experience.
- How do you stay prepared during demanding rehearsal schedules?
- What role do you typically take within an ensemble?

Collaboration & Adaptability Questions

- Tell me about a time you worked under pressure.
- Describe a difficult collaboration experience.
- How do you respond to feedback / direction?
- Tell me about a time you had to adapt quickly during a rehearsal or performance.
- Describe a situation where teamwork was essential.
- How do you contribute to a positive rehearsal environment?

TEACHING & PROFESSIONALISM QUESTIONS

Depending on the role, employers may ask:

- Describe your teaching philosophy.
- How do you work with students of different skill levels?
- How do you stay organized during rehearsals or performances?
- Describe your experience balancing multiple responsibilities.
- What rehearsal or performance practices are important to you?

SAMPLE BEHAVIORAL QUESTIONS FOR MUSIC STUDENTS

- Tell me about a time you solved a performance problem.
- Describe a situation where teamwork was essential.
- Tell me about a time you adapted under pressure.
- Describe a rehearsal / performance that did not go as planned.
- Tell me about a time you received difficult feedback.
- Describe a situation where you demonstrated leadership.

QUESTIONS YOU CAN ASK EMPLOYERS

- What qualities make someone successful in your ensemble or organization?
- How does your group approach collaboration and communication?
- What does the rehearsal process typically look like?

- What opportunities exist for growth or mentorship?
- How would you describe your ensemble or organizational culture?
- What performances or projects is your organization most excited about right now?
- What does success look like in this role?

USING AI TO PREPARE

AI tools like ChatGPT can help you prepare more effectively. Try prompts like:

- “Act as a music director interviewing me for a performance role.”
- “Generate interview questions for a music internship.”
- “Help me explain my rehearsal process more clearly.”
- “What questions are common in music interviews?”
- “Help me practice behavioral interview questions for music careers.”

You can also upload a job or audition description and ask AI tools to identify:

- ✓ likely interview questions
- ✓ desired musical or technical skills
- ✓ employer expectations
- ✓ and audition or rehearsal priorities

FINAL TIPS

- ✓ Arrive prepared and professional
- ✓ Focus on collaboration and reliability
- ✓ Show openness to feedback and direction
- ✓ Demonstrate professionalism in rehearsal discussions
- ✓ Practice talking about your experiences out loud
- ✓ Remember that preparation and teamwork matter in music environments

You do not need to sound perfect—you need to sound prepared, collaborative, professional, and authentic.
